Foray Departure and Return

Buses will be parked for boarding on the circular driveway outside the front entrance of the Main House. Please carefully follow the instructions of the walk leader(s).

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General Information

Whistle While You Walk

While in the woods, it is preferable to stay in small groups and to be sure to return to the bus on time for the return trip. The bus driver will sound the horn 20 minutes and 10 minutes before the return departure.

Should you find yourself out of sight of your companions give a single blast on your whistle that was provided in your registration packet to re-establish contact. A single blast in response should get you back to the group. Two blasts will indicate you are lost. Use three blasts only if you are in distress!

So, if you hear such whistle signals answer with a single blast to provide a bearing for the separated forayer.

If you do get lost in the forest, the bus will leave without you but the walk leader will stay behind to wait for you, and a car will be sent to pick you up. You will be charged at a rate of \$1 per mile, roundtrip. Please try to avoid this situation!

Ticks, Poison Ivy, Snakes and Bears

Please take the necessary precautions to avoid contact with these creatures. Tuck pants into socks, shirts into pants and use bug repellent if you are prone to attracting ticks. Be sure to look before you pick to avoid plunging your hand into a thicket of Poison Ivy. And should you encounter a bear or a snake, move slowly away.

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General Information

Mushroom Collection Protocol

Include enough specimens in your collection to show the various stages of development of the mushroom species. Utilize the voucher slip for field notes. This will enhance the process of identification. Take care to bring them back in good condition. Collections should be brought to the sorting tent near the Veselka Pavilion, placed on the designated table for your foray, and on the paper container together with a completed voucher slip.

Best Mushroom Collecting Awards

On Friday and Saturday evenings five awards will be given to five different forayers for the best picks of the day. So be sure to carefully identify yourself on the voucher slips with your collections.

On Saturday, three awards will be given for species new to the Catskill species list.

And on Saturday a grand prize will be given for fungi potentially new to science.

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Faculty

Raymond Archambault

Botanist and mycologist, Raymond was the president of the Cercle des mycologues de Montréal (CMM) for 25 years. Currently, he is the curator of the Fungorium at the Centre sur la Biodiversité of Montréal. Raymond is known as an active mycologist in the Montréal community who is dedicated to advocate mycology, contributing as a teacher and organizer of numerous forays as well as co-authoring the CD-ROM *Mille et un champignons du Québec*.

Tim Baroni

Tim is a co-author of *How to Identify Mushrooms to Genus Vol. VI - the modern genera* and author of *A World Monograph of the Genus Rhodocybe Maire (Agaricales)*. He was named State University of New York Distinguished Professor in the Biological Sciences Department of SUNY Cortland and has received the SUNY Chancellor's Award for Excellence in Teaching. He has served as President of the Mycological Society of America.

Doug Bassett

A Cornell graduate, Doug has been naturalist at Letchworth State Park for 37 years. Fancier of poroid

fungi and interested in the interrelationships among living organisms. Doug's database on the NEMF.org website is a valuable resource for the study of poroid fungi.


Russ Cohen

Russ is a wild food and foraging expert, author of *Wild Foods I Have Known and Eaten*.

Roy Halling

Dr. Roy E. Halling received his B.A. and M.A. in Biology from two California State Universities (Stanislaus and San Francisco) and his Ph.D. in Botany from the University of Massachusetts as student of Dr. Howard E. Bigelow. After a three year postdoctoral fellowship at the Farlow Herbarium, Harvard University, he joined the staff of The New York Botanical Garden in 1983. In 1984, he was appointed Assistant Curator of Fungi, and currently is Curator of Fungi. Since the mid-1980s, Dr. Halling has studied mushrooms and allied fungi throughout the world; primarily focusing on *Agaricales* and *Boletales*. Much of his fieldwork has been supported by the National Science Foundation and the National Geographic Society, and has been carried out in northern and southern temperate zones of the Americas and Europe, as well as Australia, Indonesia, Malaysia,

New Zealand, and Papua New Guinea. He has co-authored three mushroom field guides in addition to writing numerous articles that describe the diversity, ecology, and biogeography of mushrooms.

Marie Heerkens

Marie Heerkens, known as a Fungi-Artist, specializing in Pyrography on the Artist's Conk, (*Ganoderma applanatum*) also does scratchboard, photography, drawing and painting of mycological themes.

Marie has a B.A. in Art from SUNY at Geneseo, and is published in *The Field Guide to Mushrooms* by William Thomas, revised and updated in 2003. She is also featured in the following publications: *Mycelium Running* by Paul Stamets, *Herbalgram*, *Life in The Finger Lakes* magazine, *Geneseo Scene* (Alumni Magazine) and *Medicinal Mushrooms*.

Gary Lincoff, Chief Mycologist, Programs

Gary is the author of numerous mushroom books including: *The Audubon Guide to North American Mushrooms*, *Simon & Shuster's Guide to Mushrooms* and co-author of *Toxic and Hallucinogenic Poisoning: A handbook for physicians and mushroom hunters*, *Wild Mushrooms of Telluride*, *Eyewitness Guide to Mushrooms*, *DK's The Mushroom Book* and this year, *The Complete Mushroom Hunter*. He has collected fungi and led mushroom study tours around the world and is a past president of NAMA.

Roz Lowen

Roz is a retired mycologist who was an honorary research assistant at the New York Botanical Garden. Her doctoral research was on the ascomycete genus *Nectriella*. Among her interests are ascomycetes that occur in lichens, mold that occurs in buildings and, most recently, ascomycetes found in New Hampshire. She has given lectures on ascomycetes and general mycology to groups interested in fungi and nature, and teaches courses at Eagle Hill. She has written about two dozen publications on ascomycetes. Roz serves as an advisor for the New England Poison Control Center.

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Faculty

Lawrence Millman

Author-mycologist Lawrence Millman has written 12 books, including such titles as *Last Places*, *Northern Latitudes*, and *A Kayak Full of Ghosts*. A Fellow of the prestigious Explorers Club, he has a mountain named after him in East Greenland. He has done ethnomycological research in Siberia and Alaska as well as made fungal inventories in places as diverse as Nunavik, Costa Rica, and Nantucket Island. Recently, in New England, he discovered a hydneous species (*Radulomyces copelandii*) that had never before been found in the Western Hemisphere. He keeps a P.O. box in Cambridge, MA.

John Plischke III

John is a founding member, walk and foray chairman, club mycologist and has been awarded the Distinguished Service Award of the Western Pennsylvania Mushroom Club. He is the First Vice-President of NAMA and has been awarded NAMA's prestigious Harry and Elsie Knighton Award. John is Chairman of the NAMA Photography Committee, and has won over 75 national and regional awards for his mushroom photography. He is also Chairman of the Fungus Section of the Pennsylvania Biological Survey.

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Noah Siegel

Nationally known as an award-winning photographer and mushroom identifier, Noah is drawn by the wide variety and unsung nature of fungi. He is currently President of the Monadnock Mushroomers Unlimited in Keene, New Hampshire, and a lecturer and identifier for clubs all over the Northeast. He has done a great deal of traveling to study and photograph mushrooms.

Walt Sturgeon

Very popular at mycological meetings, Walt is first of all a field mycologist and as such has a special interest in boletes, hygrophores and *Lactarius*. He is one of the privileged few who can identify mushrooms by their shadows—without mistake. Walt is a winner of NAMA's Award for Contributions to Amateur Mycology and NEMF's Friend of the Amateur Award.

Rod Tulloss

Rod has studied the family *Amanitaceae* for nearly 35 years, particularly the morphology, and has collaborated with several labs doing molecular studies of the genus. For eleven years he has co-edited the *Amanita Studies Website* with Dr. Zhu L. Yang. Now he is working with his son David to build a new, much more extensive

website on the family *Amanitaceae* for the world. At present he foresees that the site will cover 700 or more taxa in the genus *Amanita* and about 50 in the genus *Limacella*.

Bill Yule

Bill Yule is a Science teacher and Environmental Educator at the Connecticut River Museum in Essex CT. His undergraduate degree is in Botany and his graduate studies were in Environmental Education. Since 1988 Bill has been an active member and officer of Connecticut Valley Mycological Society. Bill has been a regular attendee and presenter at NEMF since the 1990's. Bill's main interest is the study of boletes and recently the genus *Amanita*. Quote: "Basically I'm a Nature Nut and I get just as excited about an unusual Pleasing Fungus Beetle as I do about six pounds of chanterelles."

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Forays

Foray #1 - Early Bird Foray - Soyuzivka

Thursday, 2 PM

Mixed deciduous woods with oak, birch, beech, white and pitch pine, hemlock and spruce. Moderate walk on marked trails.

Foray #2 - Hurley Rail Trail ~~Saratoga~~ Brook

Friday, 8:15 AM - 11:30 AM

Large stand of conifers which consists primarily of various stage hemlocks. Also there are plenty of deciduous trees including the typical oaks and other hardwoods along with a surprising amount of mid-growth birch for this altitude. Easy walking.

Foray #3 - Minnewaska State Park

Friday, 8:15 AM - 11:30 AM

Some of the varied Shawangunk habitats include mature hemlock woods (and a Norway Spruce Plantation) near the impressive Awosting Falls, mixed woods with white pines as one goes up to the beautiful Lake Minnewaska where old hemlocks and pitch pines grow next to each other, plus drier ridge areas with pitch pines, chestnut oak, scrub oak, and blueberry.

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Forays

Foray #4 - Frost Valley YMCA

Friday, 8:15 AM - 4 PM. Be sure to order box lunch. Many different habitats including woods, pastures streamsidings and lawns. Upland woods are mixed deciduous with a mix of conifers. There are copses of Norway Spruce on the property. Easy and moderate walks.

Foray #5 - The Ashokan Center

Friday, 8:15 AM - 4 PM. Be sure to order box lunch. Large property includes woods, pastureland and lawns; Esopus Creek runs through with a pond as the center of the campus. Covered bridge and Cathedral Falls are worth a visit. Upland woods are mixed deciduous with oak. Campgrounds populated by white pine and hemlock. Easy and moderate walk.

Foray #6 - Turner Property

Friday, 1:15 PM - 4:00 PM
A mixture of trail and off-trail walking, mostly off... Property is bordered by the Rondout Creek on the lower end and kept moist on the upper end with the Stony Kill Creek. It contains a mixture of trees including some mature oak trees, elms, hemlock, cedar, ash, and young white birch. It's somewhat mossy here, with average moisture overall. This is an easy to moderate walk.

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Forays

Foray #7 - Trout Brook

Friday, 1:15 PM - 4:00 PM.

Catskill Forest Preserve. Several mature hemlock stands as well as the typical Catskill mixed forest of hemlock, beech, birch, oak and maple. Several streams. Easy walking, flat area with few rocks, somewhat uncommon in the Catskills.

Foray #8 - Camp Warui

Saturday, 8:15 AM - 11:30 AM.

Bordered by the Rondout Creek and Coxing Kill this will be primarily off trail woods walking, through a mix of grades including some mossy, and very moist areas. Bring good traction footwear and clothing that may get damp and/or soiled! Waterfall, oak, maple, hemlock, ash, birch, tulip, pine. This is typically a mycologically mystical place and an enjoyable walk.

Foray #9 - Minnewaska State Park

Saturday, 8:15 AM - 11:30 AM

Foray #10 - Center for Symbolic Studies - Rosendale/New Paltz Rail Trail

Saturday, 8:15 AM - 1:30 PM. Be sure to order box lunch. The Center For Symbolic Studies occupies 300 acres

nestled at the foot of the Mohonk Preserve. Here we will find coniferous and deciduous areas including oaks, beech and hickory. We'll fan out on both sides of the moist, marshy woods and follow a slight grade up towards a cliff. There is also a field which may support a species or two. Easy to moderate morning and afternoon walks with a lunch break.

Foray #11 - Lippman Park

Saturday, 1:00 PM - 3:00 PM.

The park is a wooded amphitheatre featuring a lake at the foot. There are miles of rudimentary but marked mountain bike trails winding through a mix of coniferous and deciduous trees. Everything but birch is present here including several cottonwood species. Easy to moderate.

Foray #12 - Churchwell / Nichols Property

Saturday, 1:00 PM - 3:00 PM.

This property features wooded plots and canopied brook ravines dividing abandoned cow pastures. One hike off trail or take the easier guided tour walking trails. Either way you will cut across a few pastures with views of the Gunks.

Ascomycete Workshop

ROZ LOWEN

After a PowerPoint overview of the Ascomycotina, we will explore the microscopic wonder of the largest group of fungi. We will examine any fresh specimens collected and will also have an array of dried collections. Have you ever seen the spectacular amyloid reaction in the ascus apex of Xylaria? Would you like to see the color change when you apply KOH to some members of the Hypocreales? See if you can find an operculum in the ascus of a species of Peziza. Look at the ornamentation on some of the ascospores. Supplies will be provided but you are welcome to bring your own materials.

We will examine collections gathered from the foray and good fresh material from other sites evaluating both field and microscopic anatomy/characters. Attendees will learn basic classification of specimens at the levels of family, genus, subgenus, section, and species.
